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Keep in mind the following requirements as you prepare your proposal for an Idea Exchange poster session (75 minutes):

**Poster Title (50-character limit):** What's the name of your innovative teaching strategy or lesson?

**Idea (850-character limit):** Provide a short, catchy blurb of the innovative teaching strategy or lesson you're presenting. Explain some of the following in bullets:

- **Who:** Which students and teachers are involved?
- **What:** Explain the details of the idea.
- **Where:** Where does this take place on campus (is it classroom-based, community-based, online, etc.)?
- **When:** Explain scheduling and time of year details.
- **Extra:** List any data you have on the success of this strategy.

**Imperative (200-character limit):** What led you to do this innovative curricular work? What is the problem you were trying to solve or the opportunity you were trying to capitalize on?

**Inspiration (200-character limit):** What are the top three pieces of advice you would give to a school interested in replicating this idea? What have been the biggest lessons learned through the implementation process? What should they NOT do?

Quotes (300-character limit): Do you have any powerful quotes from students, parents, faculty, board, or community to share? *Please attribute quotes by role (i.e., “This is a great idea” —6th grade student, or “We’ve come along way,” —head of school)*

Images: What images might you use as visuals for your poster?
